PREFACE

The material contained in the following pages is the result of an update conducted in the summer of 1985 on the document "Directory of Existing Adult Alternative Projects in Canada," which was compiled in 1984 by Ms. N. Carboni for the Ministry of the Solicitor General.

This second version, entitled "Directory of Adult Alternative Programs in Canada: An Update," contains updated information on the previously identified programs and includes additional programs discovered during the process. In many instances, programs had been terminated or modified, program co-ordinators had changed, and addresses and phone numbers had varied in the interval.

The objective of this directory is to compile as complete a listing as possible of programs that serve to encourage the release of adult offenders or alleged offenders into the community rather than incarcerating them. It is not intended to describe these programs, although some description is provided in order to assist the reader in identifying those of interest. The focus is on those projects that allow the offender to remain in the community at either the pre-charge, pre-trial or post-trial stage of the criminal justice system. As a result, provincial listings of Community Service Order; Fine Option; Diversion; Restitution; Mediation and Victim-Offender Reconciliation; and Pre-trial Release (Bail Verification and Supervision) programs are contained in the following pages.

Other programs that were included in the nation-wide listing are Drinking and Driving programs, which are usually compulsory as a probation order condition, and those programs or services that are available to offenders on a voluntary basis. Employment-related and counselling services fall under the latter category, and while they are not necessarily "alternatives" to incarceration, it was felt that the availability of such programs could increase the probability of release as a diversionary method, or at the pre-trial or probation stages. Furthermore, the category of Volunteers in Corrections forms part of the listing since such projects often allow release of the offender under more intensive supervision.

It should be noted that this Directory does not specifically attempt to locate programs available to those offenders who have been released following a period of incarceration (i.e., parolees and ex-offenders). However, where a listed program deals also with this type of client, mention has usually been made of this fact.

In particular, we would like to thank Mr. Jocelyn Roy, a law student at the federal Department of Justice, for his research assistance and preparation of materials concerning the programs underway in Quebec.

NOVA SCOTIA

Introduction

There is one Fine Option program in the pilot project stage. The programs run province-wide are the Community Service Order, the Assistant Probation Officer and the Volunteer Probation Officer programs. In two locations, first-time and some second-time offenders are being referred to the Department of Transportation's Defensive Driving Course, and as of July 1, 1984, all drinking-driving offenders in the province are referred to the Drug Dependency Clinic as part of the probation order.

COMMUNITY SERVICE ORDER PROGRAM

The CSO program is administered in each of the 24 provincial jurisdictions by the probation offices. There is a "Task Bank" which lists agencies that accept clients for CSO, placement and these agencies provide a supervisor who liases with the probation office. The extent of use of the CSO varies a great deal from one jurisdiction to the next depending on the individual judge's acceptance of and attitude towards the option. In 1983, there were 43,000 hours of work ordered through the CSO program throughout the province.

The New Brunswick Correctional Services offers Community Service Order and Fine Option programs as alternatives to incarceration for adult offenders. A Drinking/Driving Program is offered province-wide. Various Employment/Education programs also exist.

COMMUNITY SERVICE ORDER PROGRAM

The Community Service Order program is available province-wide and there has been an increase in the use of the program by judges since implementation. The C.S.O. program is administered by probation officers from probation offices throughout the province. In some locations, para-professionals are on contract with the Department to do placements and to monitor the placements. Where para-professionals are involved, they are also responsible for record keeping. Intake and other data collection procedures are standard across the province. Intake, placement, placement monitoring, and termination procedures are consistent across the province. Staff of agencies where clients are placed also provide supervision.

The C.S.O. work includes: assisting senior citizens, the handicapped, painting, clean up, light maintenance and repair work, etc.

FINE OPTION PROGRAM

The fine option program is available province-wide. Procedures require the judge to approve use of the fine option as an alternative. Entry to the program may be as a result of a letter forwarded to potential clients who are in arrears in paying a fine, or at the direction of a judge.

Intake and other data collection procedures are standard across the province. Contact persons are the same as those for the C.S.O. program.

DRINKING/DRIVING PROGRAM

The program is a Short High Impact Program (S.H.I.P.) that provides a three-hour educational program regarding effects of impairment on driving. It is offered province-wide and funded by the provincial government.

Corrections staff, specifically probation officers, provide the appropriate link with the court and provide the administrative work connected with the program. The content of the program has been developed and is presented by representatives of the Alcohol and Drug Dependency Commission in New Brunswick.

QUEBEC

Introduction

The information regarding the province of Quebec's adult alternative programs and community correctional resources was obtained with the assistance of M. Edgar Bernard, provincial co-ordinator of the Direction de la Participation Communautaire, and M. Jocelyn Blais, Directeur des Programmes for the Direction de la Probation.

The Province of Quebec has operated a Community Service Order Program since 1978. The program itself was evaluated in 1983 and its procedures have been modified as a result. In addition, their Fine Option program has been fully operational as of 1984 and is currently being evaluated.

With respect to Impaired Drivers' programs, the province is presently providing funding for several pilot projects. Furthermore, the Direction de la Probation has assigned a priority status to the drinking and driving program with the intention of studying the possibility of enlarging its scale.

A Diversion program has been sponsored by the Justice Department of Quebec and is administered by Le Service de Readaptation Sociale. This is a non-profit organization that operates in Quebec City and surrounding areas. Victim-offender mediation and restitution form a part of the diversion program.

COMMUNITY SERVICE ORDER PROGRAM

In the province of Quebec, the CSO program is administered by La Direction de la Probation through the various regional probation offices. There are approximately 1200 community agencies province-wide to which the offender may be assigned to perform community service work as part of his or her probation order. In terms of procedure followed, the probation officer may make a recommendation to the sentencing judge that the offender participate in the program. If the judge approves, the probation officer interviews the offender to assess his skills and interests, and from there assigns the client to a community service agency within the work bank for which the client performs between 20 and 120 hours of work. In addition, a sentencing judge may direct, where appropriate, an offender to the program upon completion of an eligibility report by the probation services.

FINE OPTION PROGRAM

Provincial management of the Fine Option program in Quebec has been assumed by La Direction de la Participation Communautaire. Regional administration is contracted out on a fee-for-service basis to various referral community services, each of which has been assigned a precise territory of one or two judicial districts. Offenders referred to the program by "fine collectors", who could be provincial court clerks or officers responsible for the inmate's admission to detention, are obliged to work out their fines in the nearest community agency. There are approximately 2500 community services that have been accredited as possible work placements, about half whom have participated in the Fine Option program in the two years since its inception (between April 1st, 1983 and March 31st, 1985). DIVERSION PROGRAM

Le Service de Readaptation sociale Inc. is responsible for the administration of the only diversion program in the province of Quebec. The non-profit organization advocates use of diversion as a means of avoiding judicial proceedings in cases of minor infractions and seeks to mediate between the victim and the offender. The consent of both parties to participate in the program is mandatory. Offenders are referred to the program by Crown Counsel according to pre-established admission criteria. A meeting of the parties is arranged with a conciliator who attempts to reach an outcome that is satisfactory to both parties. Results encompass compensation to the victim, monetary restitution for stolen or damaged property, and volunteer work in the community. For further information on diversion in Quebec, contact:

Administration and data collection for programs are not standardized across the province, and different probation offices and private agencies are free to develop or choose their own methods. The Ministry funds Community Service Order, Bail Verification and Supervision, Restitution, Victim-Offender Reconciliation, Drinking/Driving, and other programs. There are also two Fine Option programs that are still in the pilot project stage. The province also makes wide use of volunteers in community corrections, including individuals and volunteer organizations. Programs are handled in many instances by the various Probation and Parole Offices across the province or alternatively, by numerous organizations under contract to the Ministry of Correctional Services.

DRINKING/DRIVING PROGRAMS

Introduction

Numerous areas of the province offer this type of program--usually as a probationary condition or as an alternative to a period of incarceration. SASKATCHEWAN

Introduction

Saskatchewan Justice provides funding for the Community Service Order, Fine Option, Restitution, and Bail Verification and Supervision programs for adults in conflict with the law. A Victim-Offender Mediation program for adults is offered in the Saskatoon area only, and the John Howard Society operates VORP programs for young offenders in the Regina and Moose Jaw areas. Drinking and Driving programs operate in various areas of the province with government support. In addition, probationers may be ordered to attend various counselling programs held at Attendance Centres in Regina and Saskatoon.

COMMUNITY SERVICE ORDER PROGRAM

The C.S.O. program operates throughout the province and is coordinated through the local probation offices. C.S.O. Coordinators find work placements, monitor placement performance and audit the placement agency's documentation to ensure that program standards are being met. There are eight staff in six regional offices that report directly to the Regional Probation Managers for both the C.S.O. and Fine Option programs.

There are approximately 200 individual or group C.S.O./Fine Option agents across the province who, at any point in time, may or may not have clients assigned to them. The agent's function is to locate and maintain contact with possible work sites (placements). Intake and data collection procedures are standard throughout the province.

FINE OPTION PROGRAM

Saskatchewan's Fine Option Program allows offenders who are unable to pay their fines to perform community service work rather than be incarcerated for default. Voluntary participants are assigned tasks for the benefit of the community and receive a credit against their fine based on the minimum hourly wage.

The Fine Option program is coordinated province-wide by probation offices and administered locally on a fee-for-service basis by municipalities, Indian Bands, or other non-profit organizations. The same model is followed

for this program as for the C.S.O. program. Intake and data collection procedures are standardized.

RESTITUTION PROGRAM

The Restitution program is province-wide as well and is administered by Restitution Co-ordinators who provide restitution pre-sentence reports at the court's request. BAIL VERIFICATION AND SUPERVISION

The goal of this program is to ensure that those individuals not requiring secure custody are released to the community while awaiting trial or sentencing. Selected accused individuals are interviewed by a Bail Verification and Supervision Officer after the Crown has requested a show-cause hearing and the subsequent report is made to the court at that hearing. Three centres of Saskatchewan have this option available to the court: Regina, Saskatoon and Prince Albert. ALBERTA

Introduction

The Department of the Solicitor General of Alberta sponsors and funds several adult alternative programs. The information about these programs was obtained from several public relations pamphlets printed and distributed by the Department.

Alberta has full scale Community Service Order, Fine Option, Assistant Probation Officer, and Volunteer programs throughout the province. There are Pre-trial Release (Bail Verification and Supervision) programs in Edmonton and Calgary. The province has also developed a series of Native programs.

All programs are coordinated by the individual probation offices, but not all programs are available in all areas of the province. Since 1980, the Correctional Services Division has been decentralized and regionalized throughout the province, but all administrative and data collection procedures are standardized.

The John Howard Society sponsors Bail Fund programs, and John Howard Society and Elizabeth Fry Society sponsor counselling programs for offenders.

Although the Drug and Alcohol Commission has a Drinking/Driving course, it is not used as an alternative to incarceration but is required to reinstate a suspended driving license.

BRITISH COLUMBIA

Introduction

The provincial government funds Community Service Order and Bail Supervision programs throughout the province. In addition to these, the Ministry of the Attorney General provides monies for Adult Diversion programs in several areas of Vancouver Island and in Vancouver itself. Four Victim-Offender Reconciliation projects exist, three being funded by the Attorney General and the fourth by a private foundation. Shoplifting counselling programs are being run by the Elizabeth Fry Society in two areas while a third operates out of Victoria as part of a Diversion Centre's program. Various probation offices and community agencies provide counselling services out of provincial, federal and private funds.

COMMUNITY SERVICE ORDER (C.S.O.) PROGRAMS

The B.C. Attorney General has privatized the C.S.O. program by contracting out to various individuals and agencies. COMMUNITY SERVICE ORDER PROGRAM

The CSO program has been formally operated in the Yukon since 1978 by the Department of Justice. The Corrections Branch has made a priority of using community service as a means of dealing with problems at the community level, continuing an informal tradition of treatment of misdemeanor offenders since the early 1900's. The program is province-wide and is funded by the Government of Yukon.

Probation Services arranges placement with various community groups to provide well prepared, meaningful tasks that would not be performed by paid staff, and provides guidance to the volunteers and organization members who supervise the work of the CSO clients and who are known as community service order supervisors.

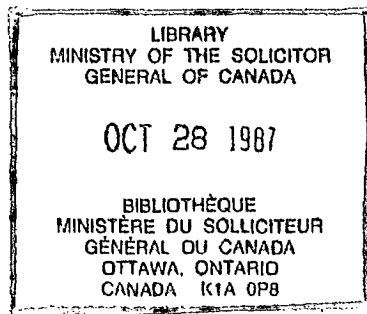
